
Driving Enterprise Value Through Architecture

Companies, large and small, and across industries have come to recognize the value and need for an Enterprise Architecture function. Progressive, forward thinking IT Leaders have successfully made the case for EA within their organizations and have established a clear vision and charter for moving forward. However, in many cases, the EA function falters during execution - not because its value is questioned, but because the EA team is resource constrained, hampering its ability to ramp up and respond effectively to the growing demand for EA services. If this situation were left unattended, the overall interest level in EA would rapidly decline and positive momentum would be lost, resulting in a missed opportunity for IT to deliver business value.

Balancing Internal EA Core Competencies with Targeted External Support

The functional scope of Enterprise Architecture as depicted in the EA capability map below can quickly stretch an EA organization's resources thin.

Additionally, identifying and recruiting available EA resources in the marketplace or cross-training internal IT resources can be both time-consuming and nonproductive. Organizations faced with such EA talent gaps can turn to external service providers and consulting organizations for interim support, as they build their in-house capabilities over time. This allows them the flexibility to focus on bringing in the right talent, while also delivering services and value to their internal customers.



The nature and scope of this outside support can vary significantly depending on the overall maturity and skills gap within a particular EA organization. However, it's not uncommon for EA organizations to seek

- **Subject matter expertise** around a specific EA domain: Business Architecture, Data Architecture, Application Architecture or Technology Architecture
- Experienced EA practitioners to assess and refine existing EA policies, practices and processes.
- Business and System Analysts to support the definition and development of various EA artifacts
- EA specialists to fill vacant/open EA roles

This model of leveraging external consulting resources is not new and has been executed on a much larger scale through outsourcing engagements, however, it's also proving its value on a much smaller scale for select pockets of an organization. It's also become particularly useful within Enterprise Architecture, as there's a relatively limited supply of such resources.

There are both strategic and tactical benefits of tapping into external sources of EA support and talent:

- EA Agility: engage and dis-engage EA resources on an as needed basis providing a flexible sourcing model
- **Knowledge Transfer:** gain insights to industry EA 'best practices' and lessons learned from other client engagements
- **Strategic Focus:** leverage internal resources to focus on higher value add activities of EA planning, socialization & positioning and business engagement
